From the Principal

Hello everyone,

Can you believe that it is already November? This year is flying past!

I am writing to you from Devonport, where I will be spending this week, participating in an External School Review for DECYP. All schools participate in this school improvement feedback process over a four year cycle, and it will be Hagley's turn to be involved next year. However, as Principal it is a role I take seriously to support other schools in this process. While I am working away, Lauren Beams will be Acting Principal, supported by the rest of the Leadership team. As always, I am thankful of the positive leadership that they provide, allowing me to be away from school to participate in such important DECYP processes.

Last Friday was a student free, professional learning day across the State. Our teachers and teacher assistants are always grateful for the opportunity to participate together in professional learning. Our teachers and ESS staff were involved in quite a few sessions to support growth in opportunities for our students. These included: a continuation of learning about the new assessment processes required for reading in 2025, learning about the use of visuals and language to support learning, a review of our school improvement work throughout the year, including planning for ideas of how we can improve belonging, connection and attendance at Hagley in 2025. For the rest of the day our teachers worked on updating learning plans for individual students. It was a very valuable day.



Our Teacher Assistants all worked together to complete several mandated learning modules for Literacy. These modules are called Qualiteach, and all teachers and teacher assistants are required to complete four of these by the end of 2024. We are certainly on track for the requirement to be completed. Next year we will be required to complete another set to improve our understanding of Literacy and the needs of students in this area.

This Friday will be Ms Heather Styles last day with us for the year. Heather will be taking six weeks leave as she heads away on her honeymoon. Congratulations to Heather and her partner, Maryanne. We wish them the most amazing wedding and time away to celebrate. During this time, Miss Tayla Luttrell will cover the class on Mondays and Fridays, and members of the leadership team will cover the days in between to ensure really important consistency and continuity for 5/6 Styles heading to the end of the year.

Thanks to the parents and carers who completed our online request for class placement information. This opportunity has now closed, and we will begin the process this week of beginning to build the classes for 2025. This does take us several weeks to complete with many reviews and edits. Please be assured that building the best possible classes and alleviating issues is a priority. We work hard to make this process the best possible outcome for next year.

I would like to remind families, that if you are aware that you will not be returning to Hagley next year, it is critical that we know this now. This information has implications for class structures and funding for teachers. So please let the office know if you are aware that your children will not be attending Hagley in 2025.

FROM THE QUALITY TEACHING COACH ON LITERACY

Next year, we are changing the way we assess reading. Many of you will be familiar with your child going "up a level" in reading and attaining a required level by the end of the school year. This is changing next year. Our teachers are currently learning a new way of assessing reading, based on the science of reading. Attached is some information around the brain and reading.

THE NEUROSCIENCE OF READING

Reading, unlike speaking, is not hardwired into our brains when we are born. The reading process is neither natural nor automatic — it is a learned skill. While humans have used spoken language for roughly 60,000 years, the first examples of written language date back to only about 5,000 years ago. In evolutionary terms, the human brain has not had the same time to develop functional areas dedicated to reading.

Reading and writing are therefore manmade conventions, not biological ones. While we are biologically wired to hear sounds and notice images, we are not wired to decode written words (the key process behind reading). To become readers, our brains have to develop new neural networks that support reading and writing. The reading process itself is a result of the brain's neuroplasticity. or the ability to restructure and redirect existing neural networks to create new ones dedicated to learning something new. The process of rewiring the brain takes place throughout our lives but is critical during early development from ages 0-8.

Interestingly, learning to read varies by individual and culture. The brain develops neural networks based on specific tasks. When it comes to reading, our neural networks are developed by what we read and the written symbols we use. Thus, someone who reads Chinese characters has a slightly different neural network than someone who reads alphabetic characters like English or Arabic.³

NEWS FROM THE LIBRARY

Reading Every Day

It is so important to make the time to read every day. Read with your children, to your children, and listen to them read or retell a story to you. Read stories, read information books, read signs, recipes and instructions. Keep reading to your child after they can read independently. Model your own reading to your child. Take a book in the car and read it when you have 5 minutes, rather than picking up your phone.



Here are some wise words from Linda Stade, a well-respected Australian Educator...

"You may have heard of 'the million-word gap'. It is the idea that if you read five picture books a day to a young child, they will enter kindergarten with exposure to about 1.4 million more words than kids who were never read to.

Let's extrapolate that out. What if you keep reading to kids for years after kindergarten? What if they read a book a fortnight themselves in primary school? A novel a month in high school?

It won't just be words they learn. They will develop comprehension skills, internalise grammar, learn new facts, and explore new ideas.

They will visit other worlds in their imaginations and learn that other people live different lives but may feel the same way they do.

All that reading will help your child build a better brain and a warmer heart. \(\neg ''\)

STUDENT ASSISTANCE SCHEME (STAS)
